

Unpacking It All

Over the past few weeks I have spent a lot of my free time unpacking boxes and organizing as we settle back into the parsonage. I'm finding that there is a lot to unpack, and this is even after we donated countless boxes of items as we were preparing for the move. The idea is that everything carried over were the things that "passed the test" and were deemed worthy of taking with us. Clearly, I have a hard time "*separating the wheat and the chaff*" as it were. As I unpack things now, I cannot figure out exactly why I packed them in the first place. My guess is that nostalgia for the past is why I made the choices I made, and I am now dealing with the consequences.

As I pull items out of boxes, I cannot help but think about the history of these things. I found the shell casing from the military honors at my greatgrandfather's funeral (he was a WWI veteran). I barely remember him as he died when I was young, but this little brass casing reminds me of him nonetheless. I found a coffee mug for the 80th anniversary of Christ Lutheran Church, my childhood congregation that closed as I entered seminary. I wasn't even alive at the time of the celebration, but it makes me think about the people who formed my faith growing up. I have come to realize that unpacking for me has become a kind of sacred act. It has provided space for me to think about the stories, and more importantly, people behind each and every item I've kept. As I prepare to teach and preach, I am finding more and more that my faith works in a similar fashion. I pull out a text I haven't preached on since it last appeared in our lectionary three years ago and how I unpack it theologically is different. Confirmation curriculum I taught years ago now look a little different in my hands as my understanding of my (Lutheran) Christian faith has changed. As I move throughout my daily life, I am reminded how important and sacred this work of unpacking really is.

Native American Land Acknowledgement

On Sunday, Oct. 9, at 9:00 am, Joseph Standing Bear of Midwest SOARRING Foundation will join us as we hold a Native American Land Acknowledgement outside on the front lawn. Our worship services that day will also incorporate Native American liturgies.

This will be a new experience for most of us – but it comes out of the theology and social statements of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in

America (ELCA). In 2016, at its Churchwide Assembly, the ELCA repudiated the Doctrine of Discovery. This doctrine grew from a decree by the pope in 1493 that any land not inhabited by Christians was available to be claimed and used by Christian rulers. This became the basis for European claims in the Americas, and for the western expansion in the United States. Essentially, the rights to the land was given to the European immigrants, without regard for the Native peoples who lived on the land.

In repudiating this doctrine, the ELCA acknowledged its complicity in the evils of colonialism, and seeks to practice reconciliation and accompaniment with native peoples. As part of that, the ELCA stated "We commit to begin the practice of land acknowledgements at all expressions of the church."

A land acknowledgment is a spoken or written statement that acknowledges the people who were the first stewards and inhabitants of the land. They are used not only in the United States, but in countries around the world where indigenous peoples have had the lands taken from them.

The ELCA and the Wider World—Indonesia

Sometimes what we know of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, of which we are one of nearly 9,000 ELCA congregations, may be relatively surface level. The ELCA is a large church body, after all. And what we know of the ELCA in the world may be even more limited: ELCA is one of 148 member churches of the Lutheran World Federation, with some 78 million members worldwide; and with a total of some 81 million Lutheran adherents in the world.

This monthly column will feature, with various Lutheran points of interest, both domestic and global concerns, that place us in the wider context of who and what we are.

The most populous Muslim country in the world is Indonesia, with India coming in second. Meanwhile, Indonesia has some 5.7 million (some say more than 6 million) Lutherans spread across 13 Lutheran church bodies, coming from various language groups and traditions. The largest of these is the Batak Protestant Christian Church with 4.1 million members (that's larger than the ELCA!) Lutherans represent a majority of Protestants, which are 7.6 percent of the Indonesian population.

Among Indonesia's 1,340 ethnic groups, the Batak people, who are predominantly from North Sumatra, are mostly Lutheran. Other Lutherans are on the western islands of Nias and Mentawai. Lutheranism arrived in Indonesia only in 1828 under a German mission (Indonesia was a Dutch colony, though). One can see the great growth of the church there in less than 200 years. Socio-religiously, Indonesia is going through some intense "Islamization." To this, one church leader has said that the key factor is not about how to grow the church, but what does it mean to be Lutheran in a changing society and world.

And this may be our learning point. What is our Lutheran identity in our own context? How do we live in our place, seen locally and in our world, with a strong confession of our faith, and a faith in action?
